GOOD NEWS FROM MRS. BOWERSOX'S KINDERGARTEN

January has been a very busy month for us in Kindergarten. We are completing our 2nd quarter assessments and report cards will soon be sent home. If you have any questions in regards to report cards, please contact me. I will be having conferences for those children that I have concerns with in February. Conference papers will be sent home soon and I need them returned ASAP. Also, report cards and their envelopes need to be signed and returned. Please do not keep either at home.

In math, we are learning more of our numbers. Please practice writing numbers with your child. In the next chapter we will be learning Number Patterns. Your child will be learning how to count by 2's, 5's, and 10's. Please continue to practice these skills at home. If you need ideas for activities let me know.

In reading, we have covered the following word families: -am, -at, -ap, -it, -ig, -ip. We will be learning the -ot, -op, and -ox words families within the few weeks. Please continue to review sight words on a daily basis. The more confident your child is in knowing the sight words the easier time they will have reading.

We are working very hard in our journals. We are transitioning from writing one sentence to writing two sentences. Please work with your child on this at home. Many children are still very dependent on me or another adult to help them sound out the words they choose to use. I am working very hard with them in the classroom to do this on their own. One way to work on this- give them a few of their sight words and have them sound them out and write what they hear. For example: if the word is 'like' they would sound it out and would probably write 'lik'. You are practicing the sight words, working on letter-sound recognition, handwriting, etc. all at the same time!

We are having fun in our centers. In the puzzles and game center two of the activities the children may chose from are Snowman Bowling or Snowball Toss. Snowman Bowling is when the students will take

turns trying to knock down all of the pins. They will set the pins up on their appropriate color of dot, and then (using tally marks—discuss, and practice tally marks) record the number of each that they knock down each turn. When playing Snowball Toss the students will tally the number of snowballs that they get in/out of the bucket. In our math center we are learning to count to 30 by feeding fish to penguins and learning our number words by matching mittens with numbers and the number word on them. In the ABC center, the children are matching mittens that have been cut with their sight words on them. Half of the mitten may have an “h” on it and the other half will have “at”. When they make the correct match it will read “hat.” They can also play *Shoveling Sounds* – in this activity, the students will choose a shovel. They use their shovel to scoop up the snowflake whose picture begins or ends with the letter on their shovel. They will put their snowflakes into their matching bucket. When they have finished, they will sort the snowflakes by beginning/ending sounds. The centers are a lot of fun and reinforce the skills that your child is learning in the classroom in a fun way.

Our Valentine’s Day Party will be coming up on February 14th. If you are interested in helping with this please let me know. You MUST be fingerprinted and have it on file in the office. ENGLISH 12 INVESTIGATES FUTURE CAREER INTERESTS

So... what are you going to do after graduation??? Students in English 12 have been researching and writing in response to that question. First, they sifted through information from a list of resources (compiled by Mrs. Kelley Purkey in the HS Library), from an ACT careers quiz, and from a Princeton Review website. Next, students organized and wrote a five to seven page research paper on a specific career interest and then began to write about their plans for the future in form of a Career Passport.

The Career Passport is a collection of three pieces of writing that specifically targets each student’s past, present, and future in form of a resume, a career narrative, and a verification of employability skills. These pieces require students mention such things as awards or accomplishments, plans after

graduation in June, and marketable skills or strengths. All will be housed in an attractive black portfolio alongside each graduate's Waynesville High School diploma. Currently, we are in the proofreading/editing stage; the finals will be presented at graduation – just 131 days away! ☺ (Don't panic yet, Senior Parents!!)

AP English Literature & Composition Studies Ellison's *Invisible Man*

“When I discover who I am, I'll be free” or so says the nameless narrator in Ralph Ellison's fictional novel, *Invisible Man*. When HASN'T someone questioned or wondered, “Who am I...really?” Man's (and woman's) search for meaning is an ongoing, universal theme that Advanced Placement English students are exploring in context of the novel and of themselves. In this class, each student has been assigned two chapters to prepare significant discussion points, activities, and questions for the rest of the group to respond. As we have delved more deeply into the work, so has the intensity of the protagonist's quest for self-actualization. When we conclude with an in-class essay next week, hopefully further insights and connections will be made in each student's reply.

CHANGES TO BCI AND FBI BACKGROUND CHECKS

All volunteers and coaches must have BCI and FBI background results on file at Wayne Local Schools. The Superintendent's Office has the capability to process these checks. The Superintendent's Office or building offices can tell you what results we currently have on file.

House Bill 1 has changed certain background check requirements for licensed educators in Ohio beginning Jan. 1, 2010:

- Educators who are **renewing** a license or permit and have lived continuously in the state of Ohio for the previous five years, *and* have a BCI background check on file **with ODE**, will need to complete *only* an FBI criminal background check once every five years. (Currently, they must complete both BCI and FBI checks whenever they renew.)
- Educators who **have not lived continuously in the state** for the past five years will need to complete both a BCI and FBI background check.
- Educators with **multiple licenses** only need to submit the required background checks when they are applying for the renewal of the license or permit that is of the *longest duration*.
- Educators who hold a **permanent certificate** are still required to submit the required background checks once every five years. Permanent certificate holders who have lived continuously in Ohio for those five years, however, will only need to submit FBI background checks.
- **Initial applicants** for a license must complete both BCI and FBI criminal background checks.

These checks need to be less than 365 days old to be considered valid for licensing purposes.

Due to the changes for licensed educators we will make the same changes for our volunteers.

Volunteers and coaches must have a FBI criminal background check every five years. If there is a BCI results on our WLS database and you have lived continuously in the state the last 5 years you will not be required to redo your BCI background check just the FBI check. If you do not have any results on the WLS database or have not lived in the state the last 5 years you must complete both BCI and FBI checks.

*Coaches or Aides that are applying for a Pupil Activity Supervisor Permit or an Educational Aide Permit must have a BCI background check on file with ODE.

The Superintendent's office will be open to do fingerprinting on TUESDAYS from 9:00 – 2:30. The cost for this service is: \$25 – BCI \$35 – FBI \$55 – Both

WINTERTIME BLUES = WINTERTIME BULK

More than 25 million Americans experience the winter blues, a form of depression that makes a person feel irritable, lethargic, and hungry for carbohydrate-rich foods.

These winter blues are often due to a drop in serotonin, a brain chemical that regulates mood and hunger. In response to low serotonin levels, the body craves sweets, which temporarily raise the level of serotonin. But this high is often followed by a crash, setting up a hunger-and-mood roller coaster that often leads to overeating and weight gain.

Here are some easy ways to combat the “winter blues” munchies:

- *Increase your protein intake. Protein has a satisfying effect that keeps you feeling full longer.
- *Eat some honey before bed. This can improve sleep and boost your mood.
- *Cut back on your intake of caffeine. Caffeine only aggravates the blues.
- *Become more active. Exercise benefits both your physical and mental health.
- *Get some sun. Spend some time outside or consider taking a vitamin D supplement.

EVERYDAY ACTIONS TO STAY HEALTHY

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.
- Stay home if you get sick, especially if you have a fever. CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.
- Follow public health advice regarding school closures, avoiding crowds and other social distancing measures. These measures will continue to be important after a 2009 H1N1 vaccine is available because they can prevent the spread of other viruses that cause respiratory infections.
