GOOD NEWS FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

UPDATED SCHEDULE

The Boys Basketball game tonight at Northridge is Cancelled and moved to Saturday, January 16th at 4:30 Frosh, 6:00 Reserve and 7:30 Varsity.

Swimming meet at Kettering Rec is cancelled for Friday - Orange and Black Invt at Lebanon Y is on for Saturday.

Happy New Year – As we enter 2010 I would like to review our school finances. On November 4, 2008, the school district had an operating renewal levy on the ballot. That levy was designed to address an expiring levy. When it failed the school district lost all operating millage above the state minimum 20 mill floor. For the entire 2009 calendar year the school district collected only 20 mills for the general fund. It took all the available fiscal resources of the school district to maintain our current educational program in 2009.

The school district came back to the voters in February of 2009 with a special emergency levy. Thanks to our community and its support the emergency levy passed. That election reinstated the school district's lost millage back to 10.15 mills above the 20 mill minimum. These 10 mills represent the same millage that the community passed in 2003. Because the millage was not passed until the 2009 calendar year, tax payers in Wayne Local Schools saw a drop in School related property taxes during the 2009 calendar year. As we enter 2010 the recently passed millage will again be reflected in your property taxes. In Wayne Local School District the median house value was \$165,000. This house is now valued at about \$149,985. The effective tax rate on the median valued home will cost approximately \$1,648 a year for school related taxes this year. In 2008 the taxes were \$1,597 and then they dropped to \$1,227 in 2009. As a result we saw a reduction of taxes of \$370 in 2009 and then an increase of \$421 in 2010. From 2008 to 2010 this amounts to a \$51 increase. I would like to point out that in 2004 the school taxes were \$1,835 on a house valued at \$165,000.

Please be aware that your 2010 vs. your 2009 taxes are impacted by levies and issues outside of Wayne Local Schools' taxes. I am very much aware that any tax adjustment in this economy is not going to be favorably accepted by everyone. I ask that the community reflect and view the 2010 tax changes in light of what was on the books in 2008. Your investment maintains an excellent school system that is a focal point of community pride for Wayne Township and its villages. Our operating plan is supported by this five (5) year emergency levy designed with annual incremental increases each calendar year to address minimum inflation and operating costs increases. Wayne Local Schools has committed to operate the next five (5) years on this revenue source. Providing a high quality educational program for

our students with local support and careful fiscal management is at the center of our decisions. Thank you for being a part of Spartan Pride Community Wide.

THANK YOUR SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER TODAY

School board members exemplify local citizen control and decision-making in education. They volunteer hundreds of hours and an immeasurable amount of energy to assure that our schools are providing the best education possible for the children of our community. Here are some reasons we are taking this opportunity to show them our appreciation during School Board Recognition Month in January.

School board members are citizens whose decisions affect our children – what they learn, who will teach them and what kinds of facilities house their classrooms.

These are men and women elected to establish the policies that provide the framework for our public schools. They represent you, and they take this responsibility seriously by attending lengthy – sometimes challenging – meetings, conferences and institutes where they broaden their knowledge about education; during numerous conversations about the schools; and sessions before the Ohio General Assembly.

DETAILS FROM MRS. DURHAM'S DYNAMITE KINDERGARTEN CLASS

Happy New Year to Everyone! I hope everyone had a relaxing and enjoyable time with their family and friends. The children have done a great job getting back into the swing of things. I am very proud of them.

In December we were very busy preparing our gifts for our parents. We would like to thank Mrs. Bailey for sewing the gifts together. You did a wonderful job. During the month of December, we learned about two- and three-dimensional shapes. Ask your child where you can find a pyramid in Waynesville, Ohio. We explored one-half and one-fourth and identified lines of symmetry. Right before break, we learned about numbers from 11 to 16. CHANGES TO BCI AND FBI BACKGROUND CHECKS

All volunteers and coaches must have BCI and FBI background results on file at Wayne Local Schools. The Superintendent's Office has the capability to process these checks. The Superintendent's Office or building offices can tell you what results we currently have on file.

House Bill 1 has changed certain background check requirements for licensed educators in Ohio beginning Jan. 1, 2010:

- Educators who are **renewing** a license or permit and have lived continuously in the state of Ohio for the previous five years, *and* have a BCI background check on file **with ODE**, will need to complete *only* an FBI criminal background check once every five years. (Currently, they must complete both BCI and FBI checks whenever they renew.)
- Educators who **have not lived continuously in the state** for the past five years will need to complete both a BCI and FBI background check.
- Educators with **multiple licenses** only need to submit the required background checks when they are applying for the renewal of the license or permit that is of the *longest duration*.
- Educators who hold a **permanent certificate** are still required to submit the required background checks once every five years. Permanent certificate holders who have lived continuously in Ohio for those five years, however, will only need to submit FBI background checks.
- **Initial applicants** for a license must complete both BCI and FBI criminal background checks. These checks need to be less than 365 days old to be considered valid for licensing purposes.

Due to the changes for licensed educators we will make the same changes for our volunteers.

Volunteers and coaches must have a FBI criminal background check every five years. If there is a BCI results on our WLS database and you have lived continuously in the state the last 5 years you will not be required to redo your BCI background check just the FBI check. If you do not have any results on the WLS database or have not lived in the state the last 5 years you must complete both BCI and FBI checks.

The Superintendent's office will be open to do fingerprinting on TUESDAYS from 9:00 – 2:30. The cost for this service is: \$25 – BCI \$35 – FBI \$55 – Both

Hand Sanitizers: Are they as Good as Soap in Fighting Infection?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) makes it clear: Washing your hands is one of the best ways to prevent illness. If you are sick, it's also the best way to keep your illness from spreading to others. But, if there is no soap and water around, hand sanitizers can also destroy the virus.

You may have heard rumors that alcohol-based hand sanitizers don't work against various illnesses, such as swine (H1N1) flu. But the CDC says using a hand sanitizer is a good way to fight this flu virus.

CDC advises washing your hands with soap and water, or using hand sanitizer, after touching surfaces that may be infected with the virus. The virus is thought to be able to live on surfaces for up to 2-8 hours.

*When washing hands, use soap and warm water and wash for at least 20 seconds.

*If you use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer instead of soap and water, first wipe off any dirt from your hands. If you don't, it will decrease the effectiveness of the hand sanitizer. Next, apply the sanitizer and rub your hands until they are dry. The alcohol will kill the germs, so you don't need water.

Selecting a hand sanitizer

An alcohol-based hand sanitizer is a good weapon against the flu and other illnesses. But you should read the label before buying one.

The CDC recommends the use of hand sanitizers with 60 percent or higher alcohol (ethanol or isopropanol) to fight infection. Hand sanitizers with alcohol concentrations of less than 60 percent have been found to be less effective

EVERYDAY ACTIONS TO STAY HEALTHY

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.
- Stay home if you get sick, especially if you have a fever. CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.
- Follow public health advice regarding school closures, avoiding crowds and other social distancing measures. These measures will continue to be important after a 2009 H1N1 vaccine is available because they can prevent the spread of other viruses that cause respiratory infections.
