The first round of H1N1 vaccines were given on Thursday, October 22nd at Wayne Local Schools. Our school district became the first district to have the vaccinations in Warren County. School age children were the target group for this first round of vaccinations. Duane Stansberry of the Warren County Combined Health District and his staff administered the shots and data entry. Before WCCHD came on site Denise Allen, school nurse and a team of building administrators, district staff and volunteers had collected permission slips, alphabetized the permission slips by grade level and classroom, established time slots, and made hundreds of phone calls to make this process extremely organized and efficient. WCCHD personnel commented on how well mannered and behaved the students of Wayne Local Schools were all during the day. An effort of this magnitude requires a collective effort that exemplifies Spartan Pride Community Wide.

GOOD NEWS FROM RAINBOW READING!

One of the major goals of reading instruction is to help children attain high levels of comprehension. Children who understand more of what they read are children who enjoy reading more. Parents can play a vital role in helping their children attain sound comprehension skills.

This can occur very naturally during your sharing time together, when you are reading a story to your child, or even when traveling in the car. Providing your child with opportunities to reflect and appreciate what he or she reads can be an important contribution to his or her reading development.

1. Before you and your child read a story together, ask your child to formulate a question about the title or initial illustrations. This helps your child develop a reason for reading the story.
2. Some children enjoy making up their own questions about a story after it is read. You may wish to encourage your child to develop questions like those on school tests. Take some time to go over all the questions.
3. It is often a good idea to keep a vocabulary notebook or word card box nearby when reading stories with your child. This provides an opportunity for your child to record any new words, which can be defined and written in his or her own sentences.
4. As you and your child are reading a story together, stop every so often and ask your child to draw a picture of a significant event. Upon completion of the story, direct your child to arrange these pictures in sequential order and/or glue them into a special scrapbook.
5. After you have finished reading a story, ask your child to summarize it in as few words as possible. Assist your child in coming up with a statement that conveys the main idea of the entire story.

GOOD NEWS FROM THE SPANISH ROOM!

I can hardly believe that first quarter is nearly behind us! Your students have been working hard and have already learned so much. Since the beginning of the year, they have moved from knowing little or no Spanish to forming basic sentences. They can now describe themselves and their friends, state some basic likes and dislikes, and exchange polite words and small talk in Spanish. Soon, they will be able to state their favorite color, the subjects they are studying in school and, the supplies they need for these classes. In the chapter we are currently studying, chapter 3, they will also learn to express actions that occur in the present time.

For just a moment, I would like you to think back to your child's first words. How long did it take from that point until he/she was speaking in simple sentences, in complete thoughts? Now imagine having to replicate that process in just one year having only one hour of contact with your child per day! Needless to say, learning a second language takes a lot of practice. While your student may not have homework every night, please encourage him/her to review vocabulary and verb conjugations each evening. This makes the arduous process of language learning much easier!

WEEKLY SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIP

Safety tip: for the week of October 19/23

Stand back away from the curb; students should stand back while waiting for the school bus to arrive. Remain there until the bus is stopped completely. The driver will open the service door to actuate the warning lights and place hand over the horn to warn students of any potential hazards. The driver will signal to students when it is safe to cross the road and board the bus. The student should check for traffic before crossing the roadway and must cross straight across the roadway, approximately ten feet in front of the bus. School bus safety is a part of Spartan Pride Community Wide.

EVERYDAY ACTIONS TO STAY HEALTHY

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Warren County Career Center (WCCC) has a 1-mill 10-year levy for permanent improvements on the November 3rd ballot. WCCC provides workforce development training and programs for both youth and adults in Warren County, including Waynesville. The levy can only be used for building improvements and construction, ongoing maintenance, technology, and equipment that has a useable life of more than 5 years. It cannot be used for operating expenses such as salaries. The last time the career-technical school district was on the ballot for funding was 1990, when a 1 mill operating levy was passed.

As library usage has steadily increased, and library revenue has steadily decreased over the past decade, the Mary L.
