MS. SINGLETON'S YOUNG FIVES CLASS

Hello, and welcome to the month of NOVEMBER! The past couple of months have flown by, and I am excited about the things that we will be learning about in the months to come. As the holidays approach, the children get very excited. Please remind them that it is okay to be excited about the upcoming holidays; however, they still need to be respectful, responsible, safe, and ready. They have been doing a great job with it thus far this year, so let's keep it up! Meanwhile, there was a lot to be learned in the month of October. The themes for the month were: fall, fire safety, spiders, pumpkins, and Halloween. As in the previous newsletter, you can read about each theme in more detail below.

The first week in October focused on the season of fall. We talked about the many changes that the season of fall brings: leaves changing colors, cooler temperatures, shorter days, etc. We read lots of books about fall; several of the books were by the same author, Steve Metzger. The class favorite was, We're Going on a Leaf Hunt. In the story, much like *We're Going on a Bear Hunt*, the children go lots of places looking for different types of leaves. We looked at the different kinds of leaves found in the story, and I asked the students who had those kinds of leaves at their house. In the reading, the students were introduced to the letter L. They learned what an L looks like and how it is formed. Additionally, they learned that the letter makes the /l/ sound. Please work with your child on the identification of the letter L at home. You can look for it in magazines, on cereal boxes, in the newspaper, on road signs, etc. In math we began a unit on patterning. We talked about the different kinds of patterns: AB, AAB, ABB, ABC, etc. The students used movements to make patterns: clapping, snapping, slapping their legs, and stomping. They used leaf cut outs to form patterns on a sheet of paper. These were shared with the class, and the class decided what color of leaf would come next in the pattern. Additionally, we worked some on shape words: above, below, between, top, bottom, right, and left. Please work with your child on the identification of these positions. The table activities for the week included: lacing leaves and stamping on their names, cutting out the letter L and gluing on leaves, playing the game falling leaves (the students put several leaves onto their tree; next, they rolled a die; they counted the dots on the die and then took that many leaves from their tree), and going on an L Hunt for uppercase and lowercase L's.

The second week in October was Fire Prevention week, and the students spent some time learning about fire safety. We read several books on fire and fire safety. The class favorite was Fire Trucks! The table activities for the week were fire spatter F's and F formation paper, Fire is . . . Art project, fire

spraying /f/ sound, and dotting Dalmatians (the students put the indicated number of spots (chocolate chips) onto their Dalmatians.

The following week was spent learning about one of my favorite creepy crawly creatures: SPIDERS! As we began our discussion of this topic, several of the students were a bit squeamish; however, the more they learned about spiders, the more comfortable they became with the topic. One of the first things that the students learned about spiders is that they are not insects. Insects have six legs, and three body parts. Spiders have eight legs, and two body parts. Spiders are arachnids. See if your child can remember this “big” word that we learned. We read lots of books about spiders. The class favorite was The Itsy Bitsy Spider by Iza Trapani. In the story, the spider crawls up much more than just a water spout! After reading the story, we brainstormed other objects/places that the itsy bitsy spider could crawl on. The children came up with several creative answers. Ask your child to tell you something that the itsy bitsy spider could crawl up. If you have time, allow them to draw a picture of the spider crawling up their object. They can bring it in to share with the other students in the class. One of the last things that we did during spider week, was to make a spider counting book. The students identified the number on each page, stamped on that number of spiders, and then practiced forming that number on their own. The students continued to work on patterning by forming patterns with spider legs, and “baby” spiders. The table activities for the week were: Name Webs (each child made fingerprint spiders on top of the letters in their name, and then used colored glue to trace the web), Spider Headbands (the children made a spider headband by cutting out a head, gluing on eyes, drawing a mouth, and counting out eight legs), Spider Web S’s (the letter for the week was S, so the children cut out the letter S, glued it onto a black paper plate, stamped on several spiders, and then wrapped the plate with white yarn to form a web), and Spider Drums (the students made spider drums from paper cups; they tapped the spiders when they heard a word with an /s/ sound at the beginning). To reinforce the letter S, have your child tell you three things that begin with the /s/ sound.

The fourth week was spent completing quarterly assessments. The students have been working hard over the last several weeks. I will have a chance to tell you about their progress at our conference on the November 13th or 14th. Amidst all of the testing we did manage to do some fun pumpkin activities. We talked about where pumpkins come from, how a pumpkin grows from a pumpkin seed to a pumpkin plant, and how many of the students have pumpkins in their homes. They tasted pumpkin seeds. The students traced the numbers 0-5 (on pumpkins), cut them out, and glued them into sequential order. They played a pumpkin seed counting game with a partner. To play the game, they had to listen to the number of seeds that their partner dropped into the pumpkin container. This was a challenging game, but they seemed to enjoy it! They worked on identifying/counting out the numbers 0-10 with pumpkin seeds. They acted out the rhyme *Five Little Pumpkins*, and then made their own *Five Little Pumpkins* scene. Ask your child to tell you the story of the Five Little Pumpkins, and see if they are able to recall it. If not, read it off of their paper to them. Additionally the students listened to several pumpkin stories: The Little Old Lady Who Wasn’t Afraid of Anything, Big Pumpkin, and The Bumpy Little Pumpkin. These are great books that the children asked to have read again and again. If you get the chance you should check them out from the Mary L. Cook Library. We also read the book, Pumpkin, Pumpkin by Jeanne Titherington. They really enjoyed the story of this little boy and his journey with his pumpkin. After reading the story, we sequenced the life cycle of a pumpkin together; and the children completed a comprehension paper showing what events happened in the story and which events did not. The students made the book Five Little Pumpkins. They used their fingers to make pumpkin prints (corresponding with the numeral on the page). They did a really nice job of listening and following directions during this activity. In reading, the students were working on the letter P. They learned what a P looks like, and how to form it. They also worked on the sound that a P makes. Please work on the recognition/formation of an uppercase and lowercase P at home. The table activities for the week included: Pumpkin Patch P’s, pumpkin painting, counting out Jack-O-Lantern teeth, and making popcorn P’s. On Friday, The students took a fieldtrip to Windmill Farm Market. We

went on a hayride, and all of the students got to pick out a pumpkin of their own. Some of their pumpkins were bigger than they were! The students enjoyed a snack, and got to pet the animals that they had on the farm. It was a fun filled day that the students really seemed to enjoy.

The final week in October was spent trying to complete the assessments, but also working in some fun Halloween activities! The students worked more on their patterning skills by wearing necklaces with Halloween characters on them. They made different patterns using themselves as the pattern pieces. After they practiced making patterns together on the carpet, they got to create their own Halloween pattern at their tables. We read several Halloween books. Some of the class favorites were:

Pumpkins Heads, There Was an Old Lady Who Swallowed a Bat, and This is the House Jack Haunted. The table activities for the week included: hunting for H's, coloring a Halloween picture and locating the hidden H's, making a haunted house book and searching for H's in the story, and making Halloween patterns. Though the table activities focused on the letter H for Halloween, we did not have the opportunity to talk about the letter as much as I would have liked. Please talk with your child about the letter H at home. Search through magazines for upper and lowercase H's. Have your child look for items in the house that begin with the /h/ sound, then have them practice forming the letter one time for each item that they found.

Friday, October 30th, the students participated in a “not-so-haunted” house where they explored the five senses. The children came to school in their favorite pair of pajamas, and crawled through a maze to get to each of the exploration stations. Here is what they did at each of the stations:

Sight—the students played a game of “putt-putt” with eye balls for golf balls. They took turns putting the balls into a cauldron. They really enjoyed this creepy activity. After they got done playing putt-putt, the students made a pair of spooky ghost glasses.

Hearing—the students listened to objects found inside of Halloween containers. They tried to guess what the item was in each of the jars. Once they all had the opportunity to guess, the answers were revealed to them. The students made a jingle bell instrument (what a great sound!), and played a game of Halloween bowling.

Touch—each child put his/her hand into a pumpkin, and tried to guess what was inside by feeling the contents. There were a few of them who were a bit squeamish, but I am pretty sure that they all tried each pumpkin. Ask your child to tell you about some of the things that he/she touched. After they were done with pumpkins, the students made a “feely” cat. Each part of the cat was a different texture. Ask your child to describe how each part of their cat feels. Finally, the students “felt” what it was like to be mummified as they were each wrapped up in toilet paper from head to toe. It was definitely a sight to see!

Taste—at this station, the students visited our “Spooky Café”. At the café, the students tasted a menu of items that included: eyeballs, night crawlers, witches warts, kitty litter, and monsters toes. The beverage at the café was a “bubbling brew” complete with a mist hovering above it! The students also made, “slobber globs”—apple slices made the lips and mini marshmallows, chocolate chips, candy corn, and pretzel sticks were the teeth which were held in by the gums (peanut butter, and marshmallow fluff). The students were encouraged to taste each item, but did not have to eat it if they did not like it. Ask your child to tell you what his or her favorite food was from the café.

Smell—the children smelled different spooky scents. They made guesses about what each scent could be. We talked about some of the things that the children like to smell. Some of their favorite scents were: chocolate ice cream, cotton candy, and marshmallows. We also talked about some of the things that they do not like to smell. Some of their least favorite scents were: medicine, smoke, and pickles. The students made “smelly” spider bracelets to bring home as a souvenir.

The students also had tombstone sandwiches, ghoulish ghosts, and pumpkin tortilla chips. It was a lot of fun learning about our senses, and making our way through the maze! Ask your child to tell you something about one of their five senses. If you want to see pictures from this day please visit the

The first week in November was spent learning about the various types of transportation. In reading we worked on the letter R—like in railroad crossing! In math, we began learning about the numbers 0-10. The students will work on counting objects to 10, and forming the numbers 0-10. They will learn a rhyme for each number. Make sure to practice these rhymes with them at home. Be sure to ask your child what they did at school everyday. The Gossard family would like to share the following information with you.

On July 2, 2009, at the age of 17, a tumor the size of a brick was found in Stephen Gossard's chest. His left lung was mostly compressed and his heart had been dislocated from its normal location by the tumor. After a biopsy, the diagnosis was Stage 2 Hodgkin's Lymphoma. The standard treatment for this type of cancer is chemotherapy and radiation. Stephen started chemo on July 20, 2009. He has treatments every other Monday through December 2009. The treatments take about 4 hours and consist of drugs to suppress nausea followed by four drugs to kill cancer cells. Stephen is extremely exhausted after each treatment and normally sleeps about 18 hours. 24 hours after completing chemo, he receives another drug to stimulate his immune system to produce more white cells which results in extreme bone pain. He spends the next 2-3 days recovering from the chemo side effects. A month after he finishes chemotherapy, radiation therapy will begin.

He continues to work hard in school and in pursuit of his dream to play college basketball. He is maintaining a 3.5 GPA, and continues to work out during chemo in preparation for basketball. You will see "Goose" on the sidelines until about midseason. He's the tall guy without any hair. After graduation, he plans to attend college to become a sport physical therapist, and to become involved in research to prevent/cure teenage Hodgkin's Lymphoma. The Gossard family thanks Waynesville and surrounding communities for their support for continued prayers.

THE TRUTH ABOUT MRSA

The truth about Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus (MRSA) may surprise you. MRSA is a type of bacteria that causes skin and other kinds of infections. Sometimes called “the superbug”, MRSA is resistant to certain antibiotics, but several antibiotics still work. And many times, antibiotics aren’t even needed – doctors are often able to treat MRSA skin infections by simply draining them. Because skin infections caused by MRSA are increasing, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) launched a new campaign to educate families about MRSA. Although most of these skin infections are mild, some infections may become life-threatening. The following are a few simple steps you can take to protect yourself and your family from MRSA skin infections.

Step 1: Know the signs and symptoms of MRSA and get treatment early. A staph infection, including one caused by MRSA, usually appears as a bump or infected area on the skin that may be red, swollen, painful, warm to the touch or full of pus or other drainage. It is especially important to contact your health care provider if these signs and symptoms are accompanied by a fever.

Step 2: Keep cuts and scrapes clean and covered. Keeping cuts and scrapes covered will help prevent spreading bacteria to others. If you think the area is infected, contact your health-care provider and follow their instructions about proper care of the infection. Be sure to discard used bandages in the trash.

Step 3: Encourage good hygiene such as cleaning hands regularly. Bacteria and other germs are often spread from person to person by direct contact – mostly by our hands. Clean your hands frequently with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub, especially after changing a bandage or touching infected skin.

Step 4: Discourage sharing of personal items such as towels and razors. Avoid sharing personal items such as towels, washcloths, razors, or clothing that may have had contact with infected skin or soiled bandages. Wash sheets, towels, and clothes with water and laundry detergent. Water temperatures for household laundry depend on the type of fiber or fabric of the clothing. In general, wash and dry in the warmest temperatures recommended on the clothing label. Use a clothes dryer to dry clothes completely. For more information visit www.cdc.gov/MRSA .

EVERYDAY ACTIONS TO STAY HEALTHY

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.
- Stay home if you get sick, especially if you have a fever. CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.
- Follow public health advice regarding school closures, avoiding crowds and other social

distancing measures. These measures will continue to be important after a 2009 H1N1 vaccine is available because they can prevent the spread of other viruses that cause respiratory infections.
