On April 10, students at Beverly Gardens Elementary School in Mad River School District were treated to designed to promote playful cooperative learning. The toys, called "Rigamajig" were made possible through the KaBoom Grant funded by Carmax in Dayton. In addition, Health Promotion's Coordinator Michael Papio coordinated an event on 13 Apr at the base Commissary, where representatives from Wright-Patterson's Family Advocacy Program, School Liaison, and Nutritional Medicine Clinic shared information about good nutrition, resources to help keep children safe and information about educational programming in the local area.



To help increase awareness about Child Abuse Awareness Month, Family Advocacy Program staff are teaming with other base organizations to conduct activities throughout the month of April. Activities will include Information Tables

with educational materials about child abuse and preventative measures; Family Advocacy staff will combine efforts with the Force Support Squadron to create Pinwheel Gardens, with the help of school aged children. The pinwheel is the national symbol for child abuse prevention through the Pinwheels for Prevention Organization; A Child Abuse Prevention and Alcohol Awareness Walk hosted by ADAPT and Family Advocacy is planned; and a Build a Tree Competition, as the blue ribbon is the international sign for child abuse prevention.

#### STEM 3.14 Fest

The Prairies Youth Program hosted the "STEM 3.14 Fest" on 14 March at Wright-Patterson's School-aged Facility. As shown in the photos, this event proved to be a great time for more 94 students, and base and community education partners who provided materials and instruction. Staff from base Civil Engineering, Air Force Research Laboratory, Montgomery County Library, Boonshoft Museum of Discovery, and the 4H Club presented hands-on activities for the youth. The students learned about robots, DNA, energy efficiency, 3D printing, smoothie bikes, and electrical circuits as part of the STEM learning.



#### **Kick Butts Day**





#### WHAT IS THE COMPACT?

The Compact deals with the challenges of military children and their frequent relocations. It allows for uniform treatment as military children transfer between school districts in member states.

Note: The Compact only applies to public schools and the Department of Defense schools.

# WHAT HAPPENS AFTER A STATE JOINS THE COMPACT?

Each state appoints representation to a governing commission responsible for enacting rules to implement the Compact.
Each participating state also creates a state council based on the requirements of their state legislation.

#### STUDENTS COVERED UNDER THE COMPACT

#### Children of the following:

- Active duty members of the uniformed services, including members of the National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders (Title 10)
- Members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for one year
- Members who die on active duty, for a period of one year after death
- Uniformed members of the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and United States Public Health Services (USPHS)





Through the Interstate Compact, MIC3 addresses key educational transition issues encountered by children of military families.

#### Enrollment

- Educational Records
- Immunization

#### Placement & Attendance

- Course & Educational Program Placement
- Special Education Services
- Placement Flexibility

#### Eligibility

- · Eliaibility for Student Enrollmer
- Eligibility for Extracurricular Participation

#### Graduation

- Waiving courses required for graduation if similar course work has been completed
- Flexibility in accepting state exit or end-ofcourse exams, national achievement tests, or alternative testing in lieu of testing requirements for graduation in the receiving state
- Allowing a student to receive a diploma from the sending school instead of the receiving school

# What happens if the member state does not comply with the Compact?

The Compact provides a governance structure at both the state and national levels for enforcement and compliance.

Where is the Compact in terms of implementation at the national and state levels?

As of 2014, membership includes all fifty states and the District of Columbia. All states appoint State Commissioners, who lead State Councils and work with state officials and school districts on implementation. The National Commission meets annually each fall.





# General Henry H. Arnold Education Grant PROSPECTIVE AIR FORCE DEPENDENT STUDENTS: THE GRANT APPLICATIONS FOR THE 2018-2019 ACADEMIC YEAR ARE NOW AVAILABLE.

The General Henry H. Arnold Education Grant program is the centerpiece of AFAS education support. The application process for the Arnold Education Grant serves as the platform for other key education support opportunities at the Society.

The Arnold Education Grant is competitive in its needs-based selection criteria and is uniquely tailored to recognize the proper weighing of family income and education costs.

Grants ranging from \$500 to \$4,000 are awarded to eligible Air Force dependents each year. The specific amount awarded correlates to a student's particular level of financial need.

A unique feature to this program — each grant awarded carries the name of an individual or organization exemplifying service to the USAF, and that biographical information is sent to each grant recipient. See a full listing of named Arnold Education Grants.

#### **Eligibility**

AFAS education support is available to dependent sons and daughters of active duty, Title 10 Reservists on extended active duty, Title 32 Guard performing full-time active duty, retired, retired Reserve and deceased Air Force members, as well as spouses of active duty and Title 10 Reservists, and widows/widowers.



Risky Business (RB) is a six-session holistic prevention intervention, developed by the Substance Abuse Resources and Disability Public Health Issues (SARDI) Program with Wright State University. RB was developed as part of a Problem Gambling Prevention Project funded by the Montgomery County Alcohol, Drug & Mental Health

Services (ADAMHS) Board. The goal of the RB program is to increase perceptions of harm associated with risky behaviors and support protective factors related to good decision-making. Food is provided. Each session lasts approximately one hour. and session topics include:

General decision-making

- Stress/Anger Management/Violence Prevention
- · Youth and Problem Gambling
- Sexual Risk Behavior
- Alcohol and Drug Prevention

### Behavioral Health

**Eastway** provides behavioral health services as appropriate to include assessment of needs, linkages and referral assistance with accessing natural supports, symptom monitoring, advocacy, outreach, and assistance in achieving personal independence.

**Samaritan Behavioral Health** provides diagnostic assessments, individual therapy, family therapy, community psychiatric supportive treatment, and case management.

South Community provides mental health and drug/alcohol assessments and case management services.



#### **Physical Health**

**Five Rivers Health Centers** provides general medical and dental care, screenings, and physicals, along with referrals to resources.



#### Education

Sinclair's Fast Forward Center reconnects youth ages 16-22 to the school and programs that best meet their needs in order for them to earn their high school diploma.

**Job Corps** informs and recruits low-income youth ages 16-24 who would like to complete high school and/or gain certificate based training and experience that will help them begin a career of their choice.



#### Housing

Miami Valley Housing Opportunities offers training that covers lease terms and other related topics to enchance housing stability.

Youth Resource Center staff can connect you to shelter or housing based on your needs.



#### **Employment**

**Goodwill Easter Seals** conducts an intake and assessment process to establish assistance with employment and/or other services that Goodwill can provide.

Montgomery County Development Services -Youth Career Services assists youth in developing foundational life skills for managing personal growth, interpersonal relationships and career development. This is accomplished through the following programs:

YouthWorks is Montgomery County's job training and development program.

- · Work experience and guidance program (14-18 years of age)
- Summer (June-August)
- · Fall (October-December)

WIOA Youth - provides in-school and out-of-school youth ages 16-24 who have barriers to employment with the opportunity to get the education, training and support needed to access good jobs and advance their careers.



#### **County Agencies**

#### Job & Family Services

- Children Services provides life skills and other services for youth and foster care alumni.
- Family Assistance provides hands-on help with applying for benefits like food stamps, Medicaid, childcare etc.

**Developmental Disabilities Services** provides intake and referrals for services.

Juvenile Court provides case management and compliance visits with youth and their family members which will include interviews and counseling.
