Quiz: vocabulary from readings, Quiz: Grammar (from warm-up exercises, syntax discussions, and/or reading annotations); AP Test Practice, Multiple choice exercises and essay exercises Composition Analysis: From popular magazines, online and newspapers, collect ads that reflect stereotypes about the roles of men and women, as well as ads that show men and women in a more progressive light. You might work in groups to collect and analyze the ads. Make lists of both kinds of ads. Determine which kinds of products show men and women in stereotyped roles and which show men and women breaking gender stereotypes. Which stereotypes are more common in these adsstereotypes about women or about men? Then, working individually, write a report that discusses what the ads show about American values, beliefs, and attitudes towards gender roles.
